In this lesson we learn the following:

1) أَكُلْتُمْ dhahab-**tum** 'you (masc. pl.) went'. أَكُلْتُمْ (you ate':

"What did you eat, brothers?" مَاذَا أَكَلْتُمْ يا إِخْوَانُ؟

2) وَمُأْتُنَّ dhahab-**tunna** 'you (fem. pl.) went'. وَمُأْتُنَّ 'you read':

'Did you read this magazine, sisters?' أَقَرَأْتُنَّ هذهِ المَجَلَّةَ يا أَخُواتُ؟

(we heard' : سَمِعْنَا dhahab-na 'we went'. نَهْبُنا

'We did not hear the adhân.' ما سَمِعْنَا الأَذَانَ

4) رَأَيْتُمُوهُ (You saw him'. We say:

' ra'ai**tu**-hu 'I saw him.' رَأَيْتُهُ

ra'ai**ta-**hu 'You saw him'

ra'aiti-hi 'You (fem. sing.) saw him' رَأَيْتِهِ

Note that in the last example the pronoun $\overset{\bullet}{\circ}$ (hû)⁵ has changed here to $\overset{\bullet}{\circ}$ (hî). This change is for vocalic harmony. The combination 'ti-hî' sounds better than 'ti-hû'. Here are some more examples of this kind of change:

baiti-**hî** (for *fi bait-i-hû*) فِي بَيْتِهِ baiti-hî

fì-hi فِيهِ min-hu, but مِنهُ

As you have seen in these examples the accusative pronoun is directly added to the verb. But in the case the verb with the pronoun of the second person masculine plural like \hat{j} a \hat{w} has to be added between the verb and the pronoun, e.g.:

'You saw him' (ra'aitum-**û**-hu).

⁵ The dammah of is long if it is preceded by a short vowel, e.g. الله la-hû, رَأَيْتُهُ ra'aitu-hû. And it is short when it is preceded by a consonant or a long vowel, e.g., شه min-hu, كَتُبُوهُ katabû-hu. This rule applies also to إله hi, e.g. به bi-hî, but به fî-hi.

'You saw them.'

'You saw her.' رَأَيْتُمُوهَا

'You saw them.' رَأَيْتُمُوهُنَّ

Here are some more examples:

'You washed it.' غَسَلْتُمُوهُ ﴿ غَسَلْتُمْ + هُ

 $\dot{\tilde{a}}$ 'You killed them.' $\dot{\tilde{a}}$ ' ' $\dot{\tilde{a}}$ ' ' $\dot{\tilde{a}}$ '' ' $\dot{\tilde{a}}$

'You asked her.' سَأَلْتُمُوهَا → سَأَلْتُمْ + هَا

5) کَانَ 'he was': It is used in a nominal sentence, e.g.:

ْ الْفُصْلِ 'Bilâl is in the class.' كَانَ بِلاَلٌ فِي الْفَصْلِ 'Bilâl is in the class.' كَانَ بِلاَلٌ فِي الْفَصْلِ

'The teacher is in the library.' \rightarrow الْكُتْبَةِ 'The teacher is in the library.' کان الْکُرسُ فِي الْکُتْبَةِ teacher was in the library.'

'The pen is under the book.' كَانَ القَلَمُ تَحْتَ الكِتَابِ 'The pen is under the book.'

'Zainab is in the kitchen.' كَانَتْ زَيْنَبُ فِي المَطْبَخِ ﴿ 'Zainab is in the kitchen.'

You will notice here that the khabar in each of these examples is a clause:

الكتبة، في المطبخ، تحت الكتاب. No change takes place in a clause after the introduction of كَانَ. But if the *khabar* is a noun it is rendered *mansûb* after the introduction of كَانَ, e.g.:

'Bilâl was sick.' كَانَ بِلالٌ مَ**رِيضاً** → بِلالٌ مَرِيضٌ

. إِنْ شَاءَ اللهُ We will learn this in Lesson 25

6) Note the following:

'a bearded man' رَجُلٌ ذُو لِحْيَةٍ

'the bearded man' الرَّجُلُ ذُو اللِّحْيَةِ

qualifies an indefinite noun, and in the second example a definite noun الرَّجُلُ . We know that the adjective of a definite noun should also be definite. But الرَّجُلُ فُو اللَّحْية is mudâf and cannot take اللَّحْية the mudâf ilaihi definite by adding الرَّجُلُ فُو اللَّحْية the mudâf ilaihi remains indefinite and in الرَّجُلُ فُو اللَّحْية it becomes definite (اللَّحْيَة). Here are some more examples:

'I have a book with a beautiful cover.' عِنْدِي كَتَابٌ ذُو غِلافٍ جَمِيْلٍ

'The book with the beautiful cover is expensive.' الكتابُ ذو الغِلاَفِ الجَمِيلِ غال 'In our village there is a mosque with one minaret.'

'The mosque with one minaret is old.' المَسْجِدُ ذُو المَنارَةِ الواَحِدَةِ قَدِيْمٌ

7) The letter mîm in أُنتُمْ، كِتَابُكُمْ، هُمْ، كَتَابُهُمْ، ذَهْبَتُمْ has sukûn. And this sukûn changes to dammah when followed by hamzat al-wasl, e.g.:

(bait-u-kum-u-l-jadîd-u) بَيْتُكُمُ الْجَدِيد ﴿ جَبِيتُكُمْ

(a ra'aitum-u-l-imâm-a) أَرَأَيْتُمُ الإِمَامَ؟ \leftrightarrow

رُتابُهُمُ الْقَدِيْمُ \leftarrow كِتابُهُمُ (kitâb-u-hum-**u**-lqadîm-u)

(a sa'altum-u-bna-hu) أَسَأَلْتُمُ ابْنَه؟ ﴿ سَأَلْتُمْ

8) أَبْشِـرْ: It literally means 'rejoice at the good news'. It is said in reply to a request and implies 'Don't worry. You will get what you want.'

9) تُسُلُتُ 'one-third': Factions meaning 'one third,' 'one fourth,' 'one fifth,' etc up to one tenth are on the pattern of فَعُلُ . The dammah of the second letter و is mostly omitted. تُسُلُتُ and سُسُسُ however, retain it.
